REDUCING TRUCK DETENTION COSTS

ROOT CAUSES OF TRUCK DETENTION

1

POOR APPOINTMENT SCHEDULING

THE PROBLEM

When too many trucks are scheduled during the same time window, yard and gate congestion quickly develops.

MANAGER TIP

Schedule appointments based on actual, historical dock handling capacity instead of baseline estimated capacity.

FREIGHT NOT READY

THE PROBLEM

One of the most common causes of detention is freight that hasn't been completely staged before the truck arrives.

MANAGER TIP

Aim to have outbound staging bays fully prepared and verified before the carrier checks in at the gate.

LABOUR SHORTAGES

THE PROBLEM

Insufficient cross-dock or floor staffing can drastically slow loading and unloading, especially during peak afternoon periods.

MANAGER TIP

Review active floor labor schedules directly alongside daily appointment volumes to match staffing with demand spikes.

4

DOCUMENTATION DELAYS

THE PROBLEM

Missing customs paperwork, incorrect bills of lading (BOL), or incomplete shipping documents can keep drivers stuck waiting in office queues.

MANAGER TIP

Proactively verify and sign off on all required documentation sets before assigning an active dock door to a driver.

EQUIPMENT ISSUES

THE PROBLEM

Broken mechanical dock levelers, out-of-service forklifts, or damaged loading bays quickly paralyze floor throughput and build bottlenecks.

MANAGER TIP

Enforce strict preventive facility maintenance schedules—it is consistently cheaper than compounding carrier detention charges.

FIVE STRATEGIES TO REDUCE DETENTION

1 IMPROVE APPOINTMENT SCHEDULING

Transition to structural, staggered appointment windows. Enforce strict pacing limits to actively avoid overbooking receiving teams during your peak dock shifts.

2 INCREASE DOCK VISIBILITY

Provide floor supervisors with a live dashboard displaying yard queues, active doors, exact loading status metrics, and expected asset departure windows.

3 IMPROVE CARRIER COMMUNICATION

Notify partner dispatchers immediately if a facility exception occurs. Simple, proactive communication minimizes driver frustration and preserves carrier networks.

4 TRACK THE RIGHT METRICS

Regularly log Average Loading/Unloading Time, On-Time Appointment Percentages, overall Dock Door Utilization rates, and accrued monthly detention spend fees.

5 REVIEW PERFORMANCE MONTHLY

Convene a dedicated cross-functional session with warehouse team leaders and primary transportation partners to pinpoint and systematically dismantle recurring lane delays.

KPI SPOTLIGHT

FORMULA

Average Truck Turnaround Time

$$\text{Total Minutes on Site} \div \text{Total Trucks}$$

The foundational baseline indicating overall yard, check-in, and loading velocity.

INDUSTRY TARGET
60–90 Mins

Varies based directly on product profile, shipment size, staging capabilities, and infrastructure limits.

MANAGER TOOLKIT

MONTHLY CHECKLIST

- Review detention spend reports
- Audit appointment window compliance
- Verify outbound freight staging steps
- Analyze loading performance by dock door
- Align with core transportation providers
- Isolate recurring facility yard bottlenecks
- Establish one clear improvement target

COMMON MISTAKES

Overbooking dock schedules; ignoring pre-staging targets; delaying documentation processing; tracking data only after invoicing arrives.

THE COST OF 30 MINUTES

HOW MINOR DOOR DELAYS COMPOUND ACROSS THE SUPPLY CHAIN:

CARRIER FLOW -1 Load/Day Erases fleet rotation slots.	DRIVER HOURS HOS Drain Burns critical drive clocks.	DOCK CAPACITY Gate Gridlock Triggers severe yard queues.
CUSTOMER SERVICE Missed RAD Risks costly delivery fines.	FREIGHT COST Premium Fees Spikes accessorial penalty charges.	THE TAKEAWAY Plan Ahead Execution > Velocity
